Final Project Grading Rubric

The final project is due on the last Wednesday of class (April 29th) and should be turned in **individually** unless other arrangements have been discussed with me prior. Because of how often things seem to be changing, be kind to yourself and choose a project that is both pushes you as a learner, but is fun and ultimately accomplishable. Potential ideas include: · skits · puppet shows · oratory · children's book creation · game creation · short film. etc. I understand if both time and technological constraints make this more challenging, so it's okay to just attempt a paper in Lingít, or if you decide to make a comic and you have to email photo's, that's fine too. The goal is to let you explore a topic of interest to you, and find ways to use the language in a different way than in the classroom. Maybe you expand on one of the homeworks, like the home tour example (does anyone remember Cribs?). I am happy to help with ideas if you're stuck!

Whatever you choose, the project should include:

- Three minutes of Lingít material. If you decide to do a written project, it should take about three minutes to read out loud, not including translation.
- · Verbs. Nouns are fun, but complete sentences are funner.
- An attempt at using verbs in the past, present, and future forms. It doesn't have to be perfect if you're using verbs that we haven't studied, but everything shouldn't be in the present tense if it doesn't make sense in the story you're creating for example.
- An attempt at using different pronouns. Again not striving for perfection, but if you have a
 character talking with someone, make sure the pronouns they're using make sense for the
 narrative.
