Beginning Tlingit II

Course Description:

Building on the foundation set in Beginning Tlingit I, this course will reenforce grammatical concepts previously introduced, while expanding into more complicated verbal constructions (making verbs in the imperative, imperfective, perfective & future modes). It will also begin to introduce working with oral narratives and traditional stories as well as focus on creation & memorization of full phrases. Special attention will be given to listening and speaking skills. The course will also include "survival phrases" & continue to introduce conversational skills.

Expectations

Due to the evolving nature of our current corona-virus reality, expectations will be very flexible. We are all in this together, and the hope is that continuing to learn Lingít will provide some stability and comfort in these uncomfortable times. With that in mind:

- Late Work: Assignments & quizzes will continue to have due dates, but can be turned in at any time for full points, up until a week before grades are due. Quizzes will be posted online & are able to be retaken to allow for technological/connectivity issues.
- Online Access: It is NOT required that you have a consistent access to the internet. While certainly helpful, physical packets will be provided for students who need them & work will be accepted via mail (or through texts/ email etc.) on a case by case basis.
 - · Mailed in work will have to be postmarked 1 week before grades are due.
- Meeting Times: The class will not have a required meeting time remotely. This will allow for more equitable access for students with limited internet/ data, and other responsibilities.
 Instead I will be holding remote office hours for those who would like to check in (Wed. 5:30-7:30), or join with other class members. These will be recorded (if a group of you attends) but again, not required.

Assessment Criteria

- Attendance & Participation: Attendance and participation grades will be based on in-person attendance up until spring break. Extra credit opportunities to increase that grade may be provided but not required.
- Homework: Homework assignments will be due every Monday, worth 1 percent of your grade every week. The lowest scored assignment will be dropped at the end of the term. The amount of homework required has also been reduced.
- Quizzes: Quizzes will be due every Wednesday, & will be able to be taken twice for those with online access. The amount of quizzes required has been reduced.

Midterm

The midterm will be an open book, open note, in class test. It will go over topics covered in the first 8 weeks of the course, as well as topics covered in Beginning Tlingit I. You will have two hours to complete (unless other arrangements are made).

Mini Lesson

For those students who have not already completed the mini lesson assignment, the requirements have now changed. Due to the importance of social distancing and the potential for some students to not have the ability to communicate with their group members there are now two options:

- 1. The mini lesson can still be designed & submitted as a group, if **all** group members are able to communicate remotely (email, Zoom, Skype, Facetime etc.) No in-person group meetings should take place, unless you are currently living with someone in that group.
- 2. Mini lesson can be designed & submitted individually, while using the same topic as the group has signed up for (i.e. you do not have to pick a different topic from your group members, you just have to complete an individual write-up).

An updated mini lesson expectation sheet will be loaded to blackboard/ included with a physical class packet.

Final Project

The final projects will now be done individually (unless you and your potential group speaks with me via email/ Zoom first). What the project itself looks like can be quite flexible but should still be all in Lingít. A more detailed rubric will be posted online/ included in the physical packet. Ideas however still include:

- skits
- puppet shows
- oratory
- children's book creation
- game creation
- · short film
